



Tomás Alonso has designed a collection of solid wood desks and tables for Karimoku, Japan's leading manufacturer of wooden furniture. They were produced for its New Standard brand, which was launched in '09 to bring in ideas and concepts from international designers. While Karimoku may not be a familiar name to Europeans, it is a major player in the furniture industry in the Far East, with six factories, 18 showrooms and four outlet stores in Japan. It does work to minimise the environmental impact of logging and has started to use more hardwoods such as maple, oak and chestnut, which it says are under-used in

money for people in Tohoku affected by last year's tsunami. www.tomas-alonso.com

Luis Eslava

The designer is working with cult pen manufacturer Tombow, which was founded in 1913. The company's writing implements are sought-after around the world for their stylish, distinctive designs and lightweight materials.

Nacho Carbonell

Carbonell, one of Spain's more experimental designers, belongs to the Japan Creative design initiative. His designs were featured in JC's Simple Vision exhibition at the Minjuzzi Museum in Milan, held during Milan Design Week, which coincides with the city's international furniture fair. The exhibition offered a re-interpretation of traditional Japanese items, with pieces made with carbon fibre.
